**Conharmonic transformations of Einstein-Kähler  
spaces with Bochner curvature tensor**

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**Geometria differenziale.** — *Conharmonic transformations of Einstein-Kähler spaces with Bochner curvature tensor.* Nota di S. S. SINGH, presentata (\*) dal Socio E. BOMPIANI.

RIASSUNTO. — L'Autore, che già si era occupato di spazi Einstein-Kähleriani di tipo speciale, si occupa ora di detti spazi nell'ipotesi che il tensore di curvatura di Bochner soddisfi a speciali relazioni.

### I. INTRODUCTION

An  $n (= 2m)$  dimensional Kähler space  $K^n$  is a Riemannian space if it admits a structure tensor  $\varphi_\mu^\lambda$  satisfying

$$(1.1) \quad \varphi_\mu^\alpha \varphi_\alpha^\lambda = -\delta_\mu^\lambda$$

$$(1.2) \quad \varphi_{\lambda\mu} = -\varphi_{\mu\lambda} \quad , \quad (\varphi_{\lambda\mu} = \varphi_\lambda^\alpha g_{\alpha\mu}) \quad ,$$

and

$$(1.3) \quad \varphi_\lambda^{\dot{k},\mu} = 0 \quad ,$$

where the comma followed by an index denotes the operator of covariant differentiation with respect to the metric tensor  $g_{\lambda\mu}$  of the Riemannian space.

It is well known that in an Einstein-Kähler space the Bochner curvature tensor reduces to  $U_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k}}$  given by

$$(1.4) \quad U_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k}} = R_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k}} + \frac{R}{n(n+2)} [g_{\lambda\nu} \delta_\mu^{\dot{k}} - g_{\mu\nu} \delta_\lambda^{\dot{k}} + \varphi_{\lambda\nu} \varphi_\mu^{\dot{k}} - \varphi_{\mu\nu} \varphi_\lambda^{\dot{k}} + 2\varphi_{\lambda\mu} \varphi_\nu^{\dot{k}}] \quad .$$

A Kähler space is called a space of constant holomorphic sectional curvature if the tensor  $U_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k}}$  given by (1.4) vanishes identically.

We shall consider Einstein-Kähler spaces which we shall denote by  $E^n$ , satisfying

$$(1.5) \quad U_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k},\varepsilon} = 0$$

and

$$(1.6) \quad U_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k},\varepsilon} = K_\varepsilon U_{\lambda\mu\nu}^{\dot{k}} \quad ,$$

where  $K_\varepsilon$  is a non-zero vector. An Einstein-Kähler space satisfying (1.5) is called a Kähler space with parallel Bochner curvature tensor and that

satisfying (1.6) is called a Kähler space with recurrent Bochner curvature tensor. For brevity, such Einstein-Kähler spaces shall be denoted by  $B_S(E^n)$  and  $B_r(E^n)$  respectively.

## 2. CONHARMONIC TRANSFORMATION OF EINSTEIN-KÄHLER SPACES

Let  $E^n$  and  $\bar{E}^n$  be two Einstein Kähler spaces. If the metric tensor  $\bar{g}_{\lambda\mu}$  of  $\bar{E}^n$  is given by

$$(2.1) \quad \bar{g}_{\lambda\mu} = e^{2\sigma} g_{\lambda\mu}$$

where  $g_{\lambda\mu}$  is the metric tensor of  $E^n$ , then  $\bar{E}^n$  is said to be a conformal transformation of  $E^n$ .

By a conformal transformation (2.1) the tensor  $\varphi_{\lambda}{}^{\mu}$  remains unchanged, but the tensor  $\varphi_{\lambda\mu}$  is transformed into  $\bar{\varphi}_{\lambda\mu}$  by

$$(2.2) \quad \bar{\varphi}_{\lambda\mu} = e^{2\sigma} \varphi_{\lambda\mu}.$$

Also, we have

$$(2.3) \quad \bar{R}_{\lambda\mu\nu\kappa} = e^{2\sigma} [R_{\lambda\mu\nu\kappa} + g_{\mu\nu} \sigma_{\lambda\kappa} + g_{\lambda\kappa} \sigma_{\mu\nu} - g_{\lambda\nu} \sigma_{\mu\kappa} - g_{\mu\kappa} \sigma_{\lambda\nu}]$$

and

$$(2.4) \quad \bar{R}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^{\kappa} = R_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^{\kappa} + g_{\nu\mu} \sigma_{\lambda}{}^{\kappa} - g_{\nu\lambda} \sigma_{\mu}{}^{\kappa} + \delta_{\lambda}{}^{\kappa} \sigma_{\nu\mu} - \delta_{\mu}{}^{\kappa} \sigma_{\nu\lambda}.$$

A conformal transformation with  $\sigma$  satisfying

$$(2.5) \quad \sigma^{\alpha}{}_{,\alpha} + \frac{1}{2} (n-2) \sigma_{\alpha} \sigma^{\alpha} = 0$$

where  $\sigma_{\alpha} = \sigma_{,\alpha}$  and  $\sigma^{\alpha} = g^{\alpha\beta} \sigma_{\beta}$ , has been called a conharmonic transformation and studied by Y. Ishii [1, 2]. A conharmonic transformation satisfies the condition

$$(2.6) \quad \bar{g}_{\lambda\mu} \bar{R} = g_{\lambda\mu} R$$

which, in view of (1.2) gives

$$(2.7) \quad \bar{\varphi}_{\lambda\mu} \bar{R} = \varphi_{\lambda\mu} R.$$

When an Einstein-Kähler space is transformed into an Einstein-Kähler space by a conharmonic transformation  $\sigma$  satisfies the condition Y. Ishii [1]

$$(2.8) \quad \sigma_{\mu\nu} = 0.$$

Using (2.8) in (2.4) we have

$$(2.9) \quad \bar{R}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^{\kappa} = R_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^{\kappa}.$$

In view of (2.6), (2.7) and (2.9) we obtain

$$(2.10) \quad \bar{U}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^{\kappa} = U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^{\kappa}.$$

3. CONHARMONIC TRANSFORMATION OF  $Br(E^n)$  SPACES

Differentiating (2.10) covariantly and using the relation

$$\left\{ \begin{matrix} \bar{\alpha} \\ \lambda\mu \end{matrix} \right\} = \left\{ \begin{matrix} \alpha \\ \lambda\mu \end{matrix} \right\} + \delta_\lambda^\alpha \sigma_\mu + \delta_\mu^\alpha \sigma_\lambda - \sigma^\alpha g_{\lambda\mu},$$

we get

$$(3.1) \quad \bar{U}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k{}_{;\varepsilon} = U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k{}_{,\varepsilon} - 2\sigma_\varepsilon U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k - [U_{\lambda\mu\nu\varepsilon} \sigma^k + U_{\varepsilon\mu\nu}{}^k \sigma_\lambda + U_{\lambda\varepsilon\nu}{}^k \sigma_\mu + U_{\lambda\mu\varepsilon}{}^k \sigma_\nu] + \sigma^\alpha [U_{\lambda\mu\nu\alpha} \delta_\varepsilon^k + U_{\alpha\mu\nu}{}^k g_{\lambda\varepsilon} + U_{\lambda\alpha\nu}{}^k g_{\mu\varepsilon} + U_{\lambda\mu\alpha}{}^k g_{\nu\varepsilon}]$$

where the semi colon denotes the covariant differentiation with respect to  $\bar{g}_{\lambda\mu}$ .

Now we assume that both  $E^n$  and  $\bar{E}^n$  are  $Br(E^n)$  spaces, so that we have

$$(3.2) \quad U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k{}_{,\varepsilon} = K_\varepsilon U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k$$

$$(3.3) \quad \bar{U}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k{}_{;\varepsilon} = \bar{K}_\varepsilon \bar{U}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k$$

for non-zero vectors  $K_\varepsilon$  and  $\bar{K}_\varepsilon$ .

Substituting (3.2) and (3.3) in (3.1) and using (2.10) we obtain

$$(3.4) \quad (\bar{K}_\varepsilon - K_\varepsilon) U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k = -2\sigma_\varepsilon U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k - [U_{\lambda\mu\nu\varepsilon} \sigma^k + U_{\varepsilon\mu\nu}{}^k \sigma_\lambda + U_{\lambda\varepsilon\nu}{}^k \sigma_\mu + U_{\lambda\mu\varepsilon}{}^k \sigma_\nu] + \sigma^\alpha [U_{\lambda\mu\nu\alpha} \delta_\varepsilon^k + U_{\alpha\mu\nu}{}^k g_{\lambda\varepsilon} + U_{\lambda\alpha\nu}{}^k g_{\mu\varepsilon} + U_{\lambda\mu\alpha}{}^k g_{\nu\varepsilon}].$$

Contracting  $\varepsilon$  and  $k$  in (3.4) and using the relations

$$(3.5) \quad U_{\alpha\lambda\mu}{}^\alpha = U_{\lambda\alpha\mu}{}^\alpha = U_{\lambda\mu\alpha}{}^\alpha = 0$$

and

$$(3.6) \quad U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k + U_{\mu\nu\lambda}{}^k + U_{\nu\lambda\mu}{}^k = 0$$

we obtain

$$(3.7) \quad (\bar{K}_\alpha - K_\alpha) U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^\alpha = (n-3) \sigma_\alpha U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^\alpha.$$

Transvecting (3.7) with  $\sigma^\nu$  we get

$$(3.8) \quad (\bar{K}_\alpha - K_\alpha) U_{\lambda\mu\beta}{}^\alpha \sigma^\beta = 0.$$

On the other hand transvection of (3.4) with  $\sigma^\varepsilon$  gives

$$(3.9) \quad (\bar{K}_\alpha - K_\alpha + 2\sigma_\alpha) U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k \sigma^\alpha = 0.$$

Hence, we find either

$$(3.10) \quad U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k = 0$$

or

$$(3.11) \quad (\bar{K}_\alpha - K_\alpha) \sigma^\alpha = -2\sigma_\alpha \sigma^\alpha.$$

We consider the case in which (3.11) holds. Transvecting (3.4) with  $(\bar{K}_k - K_k) \sigma^v$  we have

$$\begin{aligned} (\bar{K}_\varepsilon - K_\varepsilon) (\bar{K}_k - K_k) \sigma^v U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k &= -2 (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k \sigma^v \sigma_\varepsilon - \\ &- \{ (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\lambda\mu\nu\varepsilon} \sigma^k \sigma^v + (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\varepsilon\mu\nu}{}^k \sigma^v \sigma_\lambda + \\ &+ (\bar{K}_k - K_k) \sigma^v \sigma_\mu U_{\lambda\varepsilon\nu}{}^k + (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\lambda\mu\varepsilon}{}^k \sigma_\nu \sigma^v \} + \\ &+ \sigma^\alpha \{ (\bar{K}_\varepsilon - K_\varepsilon) U_{\lambda\mu\nu\alpha} \sigma^v + (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\alpha\mu\nu}{}^k g_{\lambda\varepsilon} \sigma^v + \\ &+ (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\lambda\alpha\nu}{}^k g_{\mu\varepsilon} \sigma^v + (\bar{K}_k - K_k) U_{\lambda\mu\alpha}{}^k g_{\nu\varepsilon} \sigma^v \} \end{aligned}$$

which on using equations (3.11), (3.7) and (3.8) reduces to (3.12)

$$(3.12) \quad (n-1) \sigma_\alpha \sigma^\alpha U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^\beta \sigma_\beta = 0.$$

Hence, we find either

$$(3.13) \quad \sigma_\alpha \sigma^\alpha = 0,$$

which implies that  $\sigma$  is constant

or

$$(3.14) \quad \sigma_\beta U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^\beta = 0.$$

When (3.14) holds, (3.4) becomes

$$(\bar{K}_\varepsilon - K_\varepsilon) U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k = -2 \sigma_\varepsilon U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k - [U_{\lambda\mu\nu\varepsilon} \sigma^k + U_{\varepsilon\mu\nu}{}^k \sigma_\lambda + U_{\lambda\varepsilon\nu}{}^k \sigma_\mu + U_{\lambda\mu\varepsilon}{}^k \sigma_\nu].$$

Transvecting this equation with  $\sigma_k$  and using (3.14) we get

$$\sigma_k \sigma^k U_{\lambda\mu\nu\varepsilon} = 0.$$

Hence, we find either (3.10) or (3.13). In the case of (3.13) the equation (3.4) becomes

$$(\bar{K}_\varepsilon - K_\varepsilon) U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k = 0,$$

from which follows either (3.10) or  $\bar{K}_\varepsilon = K_\varepsilon$ .

Thus we have

**THEOREM 3.1.** *If a  $Br(E^n)$  is transformed into another  $Br(E^n)$  by a conharmonic transformation, then the following cases occur:*

- 1) *the space is that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature.*
- 2)  *$\sigma$  is constant and the recurrence vectors coincide.*

Since an Einstein-Kähler recurrent space is a  $Br(E^n)$ , from the above theorem we have the following

**COROLLARY.** *If an Einstein-Kähler space is transformed into another Einstein-Kähler space by a conharmonic transformation as follows:*

*a  $Br(E^n)$ -space  $\rightarrow$  a recurrent  $E^n$ -space*

*or*

*a recurrent  $E^n$ -space  $\rightarrow$  a  $Br(E^n)$ -space or a recurrent  $E^n$ -space*

*then the space is that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature or  $\sigma$  is constant and the recurrence vectors coincide.*

Now, if  $\sigma$  is constant and the space is not of constant holomorphic sectional curvature, then (3.1) can be written as

$$\bar{U}_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k{}_{;\varepsilon} = U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k{}_{;\varepsilon}.$$

Consequently, a  $Br(E^n)$  may be transformed into a  $Br(E^n)$  by a conharmonic transformation.

Therefore, in view of Theorem 3.1, we have

**THEOREM 3.2.** *The necessary and sufficient condition for a  $Br(E^n)$  which is not of constant holomorphic sectional curvature to be transformed into another  $Br(E^n)$  is that  $\sigma$  is constant.*

#### 4. CONHARMONIC TRANSFORMATION OF $B_S(E^n)$ SPACES

If  $E^n$  and  $\bar{E}^n$  are both  $B_S(E^n)$ , then regarding  $K_\varepsilon$  and  $\bar{K}_\varepsilon$  both zero and proceeding exactly in the same way as in the proof of Theorem 3.1, we find either  $U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k = 0$  or  $\sigma$  is constant. Hence, we have

**THEOREM 4.1.** *If a  $B_S(E^n)$  is transformed into another  $B_S(E^n)$  by a conharmonic transformation, then the space is that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature or  $\sigma$  is constant.*

**COROLLARY.** *If an Einstein-Kähler space is transformed into another Einstein-Kähler space by a conharmonic transformation as follows:*

$$a \ B_S(E^n)\text{-space} \rightarrow a \ \text{symmetric } E^n\text{-space}$$

or

$$a \ \text{symmetric } E^n\text{-space} \rightarrow a \ B_S(E^n)\text{-space or a symmetric } E^n\text{-space}$$

then the space is that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature or  $\sigma$  is constant.

Also we have

**THEOREM 4.2.** *A necessary and sufficient condition for a  $B_S(E^n)$  which is not of constant holomorphic sectional curvature to be transformed into another  $B_S(E^n)$  by a conharmonic transformation is that  $\sigma$  is constant.*

Next, we assume that an  $E^n$  is a  $Br(E^n)$  and  $\bar{E}^n$  is a  $B_S(E^n)$ . Then regarding  $\bar{K}_\varepsilon$  as zero and proceeding exactly the same way as in the proof of Theorem 3.1 we find either  $U_{\lambda\mu\nu}{}^k = 0$  or  $\sigma$  is constant and  $K_\varepsilon = \bar{K}_\varepsilon = 0$ . However, since  $K_\varepsilon$  is a non-zero vector, the space must be that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature. Hence, we have

**THEOREM 4.3.** *If a  $Br(E^n)$  is transformed into a  $B_S(E^n)$  or a  $B_S(E^n)$  is transformed into a  $Br(E^n)$  by a conharmonic transformation, then the space is that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature.*

Since a Kähler space which is symmetric in the sense of Cartan is a  $Bs(E^n)$ , from this theorem we have the following.

**COROLLARY.** *If an  $E^n$  is transformed into another  $E^n$  by a conharmonic transformation as follows:*

*a  $Br(E^n)$ -space  $\rightarrow$  a symmetric  $E^n$ -space*

*a  $Bs(E^n)$ -space  $\rightarrow$  a recurrent  $E^n$ -space*

*a recurrent  $E^n$ -space  $\rightarrow$  a  $Bs(E^n)$ -space or a symmetric  $E^n$ -space*

*a symmetric  $E^n$ -space  $\rightarrow$  a  $Br(E^n)$ -space or a recurrent  $E^n$ -space*

*then, the space must be that of constant holomorphic sectional curvature.*

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
